Jerusalem.

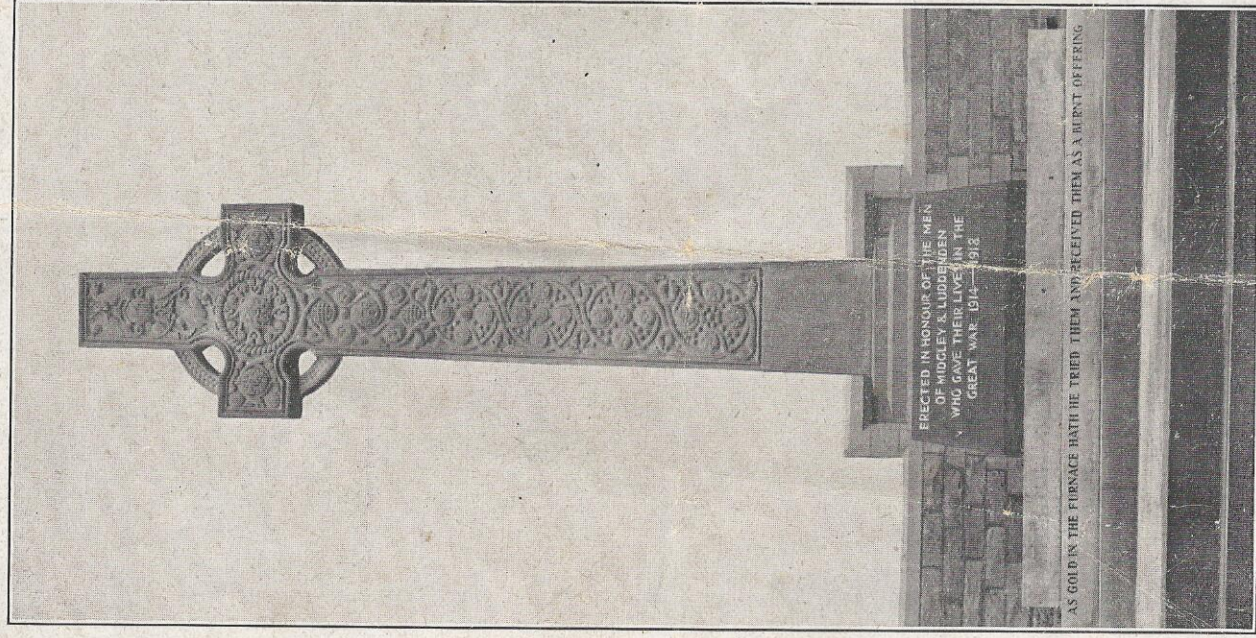
And he shall judge between the nations, and shall reprove many
